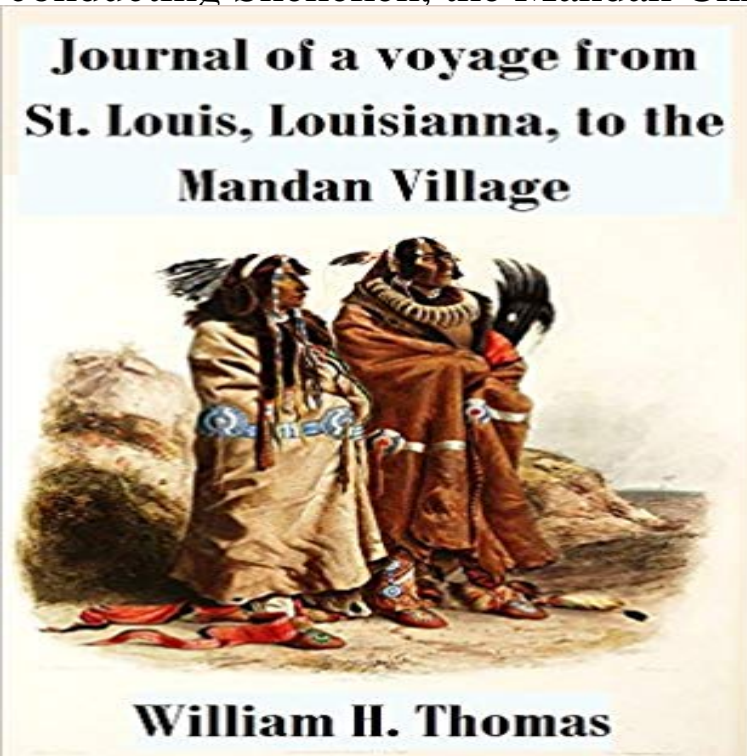

This book is a journal written by William H. Thomas who was the surgeon to the Missouri Fur Company's party, that, in 1809, voyaged down the Missouri River to the Mandan Village to not only trade furs but also to return Chief Sheheke to his village. Chief Sheheke had journeyed with Lewis and Clark on their return from exploring the Louisiana territory. He had been promised safe return to his village. Manuel Lisa and Thomas James also were on this expedition. James wrote about this trip in his book *Three Years among the Indians and Mexicans*. Dr. Thomas' journal includes details of Colter's run.
