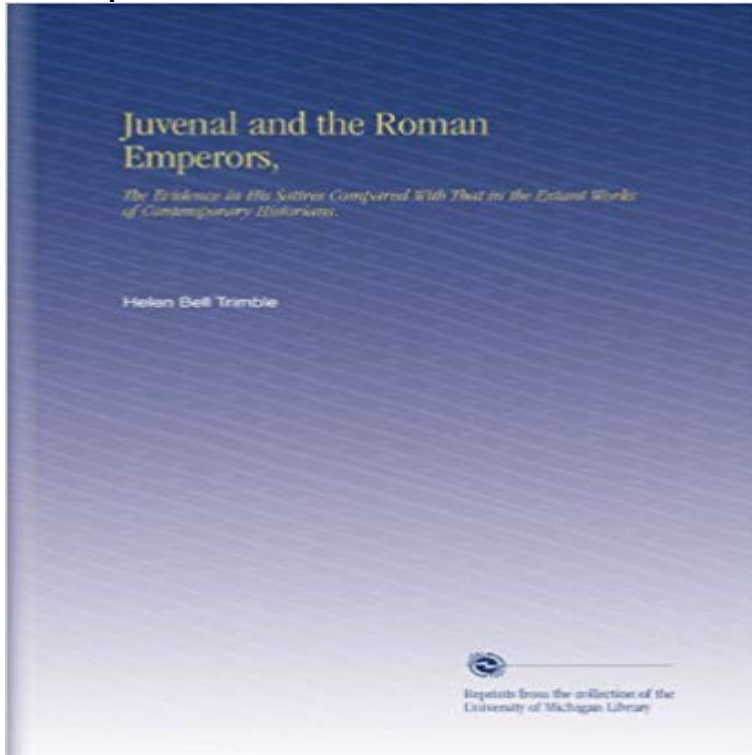


Juvenal and the Roman Emperors,: The Evidence in His Satires Compared With That in the Extant Works of Contemporary Historians.
